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Trump visits: Are they over for season?

The Mar-a-Lago Club typically shuts its doors after Mother's Day, but president still could come.

The days of entertaining foreign leaders and dignitaries on the grounds of Mar-a-Lago this season might be over for President Donald Trump.

His Mar-a-Lago Club typically shuts its doors for the summer after Mother's Day (May 14), leaving the president three more chances to slip out of the Capitol for a weekend getaway.

Club manager Bernd Lembcke didn't respond to emails requesting information about when and whether the club will close this off-season. But some inferences can be made about whether Trump will visit Palm Beach in coming months.

If Trump's travel schedule is as unpredictable as his governing style, it's possible he could come outside the normal visiting season. When Trump is here, the Secret Service mandates several road closures around Mar-a-Lago. Those closures repeatedly impacted travelers who

Bumpy ride for old courthouse

Halls of justice — places of guilt and innocence, union and split — echo with the human condition, then the historic courthouse that once served Palm Beachers must have had a bumpy ride.

It did, even minus the drama of trials and verdicts, and couples getting hitched.

Sure, the regal Neoclassic building, which served the county for decades, is

Tall tower prompts dueling petitions

Rivals criticize plan for building on West Palm Beach waterfront.

Related Cox' plan to build a 25-story office tower along the West Palm Beach waterfront is not only stirring petitions from residents, but also drawing criticism from rival builders.

Sensing blood in the water, New York developer Charles Cohen, a part-time Palm Beacher, has sent city officials another letter urging them to act quickly on his proposal

build an office tower on the city-owned "tent site" land.

The move comes as city officials held two meetings this month, where impassioned city residents voiced opposition to the One Flagler tower. The tower would be on Flagler Drive, next to the First Church of Christ, Scientist. The land now is zoned for only five stories.

Related's bid to build One Flagler has mobilized some city residents who don't like the plan. They say the tower is too tall and will worsen traffic, block some of their views and forever ruin the city's waterfront.

They've circulated a petition and now claim nearly

1,000 names on it, which Related built. At the shopping and dining center, bewildered Easter tourists encountered a table in front of retailer Anthropologie seeking petition signers.

The Breakers plans to honor the late Mary Lily Kenan Flagler Bingham by opening a shop in her name on the 100th anniversary of her death.

The resort wants to build a small ice cream and candy shop in what is now the breezeway connecting its Palm Court and porte-co-

chère. It will be named Mary Lily's, after the Kenan family member who married Henry Flagler, the resort's founder. "Naming the store in Mary Lily's honor is a small but meaningful way to remember the very important role she played in the unique history of The Breakers," Breakers President Paul Leone said in an email Thursday. The 404-square-foot shop

is expected to open just before Thanksgiving, he said. It will be part of the Palm Court fountain area at the southwest side of the main building, according to Steve Pollio of Peacock & Lewis Architects and Planners. Pollio informally presented plans Wednesday to the Landmarks Preservation
